Exploring the I in EEDI*: Learn about Nottingham's 'More in Common' Network

Join this workshop to explore how Nottingham's More in Common Network is using inclusive, community-led approaches to tackle prejudice, reduce stigma, and foster social cohesion. Through open dialogue and meaningful connection, the network brings together people from all backgrounds to bridge divides and work across lines of difference.

You'll also have the chance to reflect on what support your organisation may need to meet its *Equality, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EEDI) commitments and how the More in Common approach can help.

The More in Common Network is a UK-wide movement inspired by Jo Cox's powerful message: 'We have more in common than that which divides us'. It brings together local groups and partnerships that are committed to building unity and trust within their communities. Nottingham's network was established in 2022 by The Renewal Trust and Communities Inc, with support from the Jo Cox Foundation and Nottingham City Council. Since then, it has hosted three community dialogue events. NCVS joined the partnership in 2024 to help amplify this message and support more voluntary organisations to get involved.

Beyond the Numbers: Embedding Impact in Volunteer Programmes

In this workshop, we'll explore both the benefits and challenges of assessing the impact of volunteer programmes.

With increasing pressure on the VCSE sector to demonstrate value from funders, public sector partners, trustees, and senior leaders, it's more important than ever to evidence the difference volunteers make. But impact is about more than counting volunteers or tracking hours.

We'll discuss how to move towards a more meaningful, outcomes-focused approach and explore practical ways to embed impact assessment into the day-to-day running of your volunteer programme. The session will also consider the types of support organisations may need to take an 'Impact First' approach.

You'll come away with a clearer sense of how to demonstrate the true value of volunteering, and practical ways to embed impact into your everyday practice.

Building a Voluntary Sector Provider Collaborative (working in partnership)

In this workshop we will discuss the pros and cons of working in partnership as well as explore the different models that foster collaboration.

The public sector is more and more reliant on VCSE organisations to support the delivery of public services. Recent changes in public services, especially in the NHS, will make it more difficult to directly commission small providers. As contract sizes get bigger, it will limit the number of organisations that will have the capacity to respond.

Developing the conditions for collaboration, whether using a lead provider or a lead contractor, will enable smaller organisations to be part of effective delivery models. All partners can play to their strengths, and risk is apportioned appropriately.

We will also explore what types of support may be required in order for groups to be 'commissioning ready' and what measure of due diligence may be expected by public sector commissioners.

You'll gain insight into collaborative models that work, and learn what's needed to get your organisation ready to be part of future commissioning opportunities.
